

In Columbia as it is in Heaven: Confession and Repentance

1. Catch Up On Life:

This is when we update each other on the things that Jesus has been up to in our lives since we last saw each other. As church family, we care about each other's lives: what we're celebrating, what we're mourning, what decisions we are praying through, and everything in between. (1 Thessalonians 2:8, Romans 12:10 and 15)

- Celebrate the wins where have you seen Jesus working in the last week (shaping you to be more like Himself or working in the lives of those that He's put around you)?
- What (if any) big life updates do you need to catch us up on (positive or negative)?

Pray: Take every opportunity to pray and thank God for the good He's doing in our lives, and ask for help and healing anywhere there is pain.

2. Review the Mission:

Just like God the Father sent Jesus on a mission of reconciliation for us, Jesus sends us out as ambassadors of His reconciliation. We are called to make disciples wherever we go. (John 20:21 and 2 Corinthians 5:18-20)

People:

- Reactive Who in your life (family, coworkers, etc.) can we
 join you in praying for? Who has God put around you that
 is showing spiritual interest? Who is hurting and could use
 some love from our group?
- Proactive Who are the people we are intentionally living on mission with (neighbors, STC partner organizations, or a specific demographic in Columbia)? What are our upcoming plans to love, serve, and build relationships with this group?

Plan:

 Are there any rhythms already planned, or an extra rhythm we could plan to create a way for these friends to connect with our group?

Pray: Prayer is the fuel of God's mission. Let's pray for our people by name; pray for their needs, and opportunities to have spiritual conversations that help them take next steps toward Jesus.

3. Sermon Discussion:

God uses His Word to reveal Himself to us, equip us to live the good life He's designed for us, show us our sin, and strengthen us as we follow Him. We preach the Word on Sundays and apply it as a LifeGroup throughout the week. (2 Timothy 3:16-17, Colossians 1:9-12 and James 1:22-25)

Primary Passage: 1 John 1:5-10

Read **1 John 1:5-10** out loud. Spend some time silently reflecting and journaling the following questions as a LifeGroup

- What stands out from the passage?
- What does this passage reveal to us about God?
- What does this passage reveal to us about people?
- Share with one another what you thought, reflected, and wrote about.

What stood out overall from the sermon?

Our covenant practice for this week is confession and repentance:

Confession of sin to God and others exposes areas of guilt, shame, and brokenness in our lives. Repentance turns us from sin to Jesus' love so that we obey Him through the power of the Spirit. **Therefore, I commit** to confession and repentance, fully expecting and welcoming correction from church family.

How have you seen confession and repentance lead to you or someone else's spiritual growth?

Every week we engage the heart as a LifeGroup because Jesus calls us to walk in the light, confessing our sins to God and each other. God's Spirit works through confession and community to lead us to repentance. (Romans 3:23-24, James 5:16 and 1 John 1:5-10)

4. Engage the Heart:

In the sermon, we said confession means agreeing with God about what is sin. This can look like sins of omission (things you did that you shouldn't do), sins of commission (things you didn't do that you should do), disordered desires (things that draw your thoughts and affections away from God), and idolatry (finding identity in something other than God).

Take some time silently writing down the sins you need to confess to God and others and what repentance would look like. After a few minutes, share with one another what you wrote. Make sure to write down one another's sins and steps of repentance so you can hold one another accountable. (As people confess sin, make sure to remind one another of the good news Jesus offers. If need be, use the worksheet "Go-to Verses Offering Good News" at MidtownLifeGroups.com)

Name	Sin(s) to confess	What does repentance look like?

Pray: James tells us that a community that regularly confesses sin and prays for each other will see a lot of healing. Confess your sins to God in prayer and pray for each other. **Pray** for the Spirit to work in you as you take steps of repentance.
